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From the Archives: Show the Kindness of God

Editor's Note: This article was published in the August 1995 issue of the *Connections Newsletter*, the precursor to this publication. Pastor Franklin Horne was our pastor then. Many of you will remember him, as well as his leadership in our church at that time. We hope you will be blessed by his words now, just as many were blessed by his words then.

When David became king of both Judah and Israel he inquired if there were any descendants of the house of Saul. After finding out about one son of Jonathan still surviving, David sent for him, that he "may show the kindness of God." (2 Samuel 9:3)

Do we want to show the kindness of God to people around us? Now, the house of Saul was David's enemy until Saul died. Except for Jonathan, all of Saul's army had searched diligently for David to put him to death. But God had appointed David to be the next king of Israel, and God himself protected him.

When David asked for any descendants of Saul, many thought he would be justified for bringing justice on them; but this was not David's plan. "For Jonathan's sake," David said. "I will show him kindness." You see, David loved Jonathan as a brother.

Mephibosheth, Jonathan's son, arrived at the palace, and when he came in the presence of King David, he fell prostrate on his face. Maybe he feared the worst was about to happen. David reassured him with these words: "Do not fear, for I will surely show kindness to you for the sake of your father Jonathan..." (2 Samuel 9:7)

Mephibosheth was given all of Saul's land and was guaranteed a place at David's table, where abundant food was always served. Another thing about Mephibosheth was the fact that he was handicapped. He had been lame since he had been dropped by a nurse when he was very young. Most lame people, especially males, were outcasts in Israel. David truly did show "The Kindness of God". Can we do any less?

This touching story of David's kindness can and should inspire all of us to go and do likewise. There are those all around us who need our help. Some need our shoulder to lean on or our encouraging words (words to be strengthened by), others may need financial help to keep their children in church school or pay an unexpected bill. Whatever the need may be, we can show "the kindness of God" by helping those around us who have genuine needs.

Music: Healing for the Soul

It's been over a year since the dreaded virus took near complete control of our plans. The world came to a screeching halt, and as time went on, events were postponed or cancelled. Some notable examples of this include GC Session, Michigan Camp Meeting, and the Lake Union Pathfinder Camporee. GC Session, originally scheduled for the end of June 2020, has now been postponed twice, and moved locations. Michigan Camp Meeting was cancelled for 2020 but returned in 2021. The Lake Union Pathfinder Camporee was originally scheduled for September 2021 but was postponed to 2022 because of the uncertainty with the restrictions this year.

One of the hardest hit sectors in the ongoing disaster was the music industry, especially lesser-known musicians. Entire tours were cancelled, and music production was sometimes impossible. When many people lost their income sources, album sales plummeted. In a press release in May 2020, the Gospel Music Association said, "Many lesser-known musicians are scraping rock bottom, due to the inability to tour and sell their albums."

Now that the world is opening back up and people are returning to normal life again, artists all over the nation are tactfully planning tours, in the hope that it will stabilize their unique situation. Our own music ministry, led by Marcia Mohr, has scheduled two concerts in the scope of this article—one, to be held on July 31 at 6pm, by Matt and Josie Minikus, and another by Scott Michael Bennett during the worship service on August 14.

The Minikus' family is no stranger to Cadillac. Josie is a native of Northern Michigan, having grown up in the Kalkaska area. According to their website, she began piano lessons at age nine and started crafting her own songs at age eleven. Adolescence brought shyness, but eventually she had to make a decision to either use her talent—or lose it. Her debut song, the hopeful ballad "I Love You Anyway", has led thousands to easily see a forgiving, loving Jesus. Their bio states, "Josie's clear, ethereal soprano floats above her delicate piano phrasing, awakening in listeners a love for all things holy."

Matt hails from Iowa, where he found his interest in music as an eight-year-old—in an Elvis costume (his grandfather's dress pants and shoes), a fake wooden sword turned guitar, and a sold-out concert hall of family members and pets. However, as Matt's youth scurried onto the scene, his inner-Elvis retreated. But when a late-teen spiritual awakening coincided with a musical awakening, he soon found himself performing in front of large audiences alongside evangelist David Asscherick.

The duo introduced themselves to each other in 2002. Josie's attention was suddenly arrested when she heard a certain voice in a recording of a live concert—the one of Matt Minikus. It wasn't love at first soundbite however, as Josie recalls, "I thought he was the strangest person I had ever met and was not interested at all." Matt, on the other hand, was instantly attracted to the pretty brunette, and pursued her until her feelings were changed. As the old saying says, the rest is history. They have toured through much of North America, Europe, Australia, and New Zealand, and have recorded five albums together.

Scott Michael Bennett is one who needs no introduction. The international Christian artist is widely known for his deeply moving concerts and meaningful, reverent music. His talent was discovered as a teenager, where he began to focus his gift under the guidance of two experienced vocalists, Dr. Jeannie Pedersen-Smith and Dr. Stephen Zork of Andrews University. In 2001, Bennett was the winner of the National Young Artists' Competition in the Vocal Performance category, singing two Shakespearean songs with a full orchestral accompaniment in front of over 2000 attendees. He would later go on to be accepted into the Grammy Award winning Phoenix Symphony Chorus and Arizona State University's Men's Chorus, where he was awarded a scholarship for his musical and scholastic performance.

Bennett performed in numerous Broadway musicals, and was given the lead role of "Father" in "The Secret Garden" and "The Carnival of Venice". While this was entertaining, he knew he had a deeper calling. In 2008, he quit his nearly decade long career in computer networking, and launched into full time music ministry. He married the love of his life, Heather, in 2009, and together they have two daughters. Bennett has released five albums, and his musical career has taken him all over the world from the Pentagon to the Cayman Islands. "Scott's concerts are simply more than music," his enthusiastically website states.

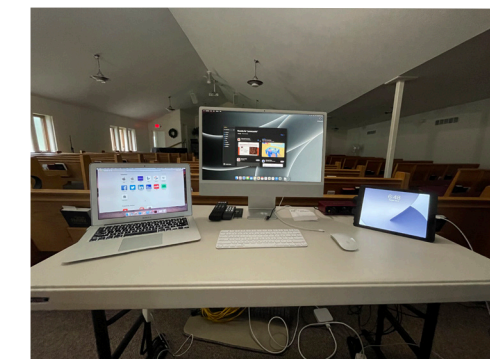
Adjusting the Gain Samuel Girven

Our church has gone through many stages of reconstruction. The late 1940s and early 1950s were characterized by the construction of the then-new church building and establishing a church school. The 1960s and 1970s focused a lot on the church school; for example the construction of a new school building, and eventually, the conversion of the parsonage into a community service building. The 1980s and 1990s were focused on church expansion, and the planting of a new church in Cadillac (that church is now known as the 13th Street Seventh-day Adventist Church).

What we find, is that the mid-1990s is also when we last did any significant upgrades to the audio-visual systems of the church. Church membership stood around 300 members then, and the church would go through a major renovation process in that decade. For some of our readers, this may seem like yesterday, but in technology...that is almost prehistoric.

1990s technology was flashy, bright, and new. Windows 95 and desktop computers, with thick, chunky cathode ray tube screens were all the rage. Dot-matrix printers, borrowing some technology from typewriters and word processors, were in the spotlight too. Music labels were starting to release songs on a silly gadget called a compact disc. While that may seem like yesterday, that was nearly thirty years ago! Audio technology can sometimes last a lifetime, but for visual technology to last that long is nearly a miracle itself. Craig Soule, when I discussed the system with him some time ago quipped, "I remember wiring that system...and that was a long time ago!"

In September of 2019, the new leadership in Communications made the leap to streaming. They started with a cell phone camera and worked up to another type of camera called a Mevo. But when the COVID-19 pandemic appeared on our doorstep, the church went offline, both literally and figuratively. When we returned to church in June 2020 though, we knew we had outgrown our system. It was then that the joint media and communications department, affectionately known as "CadComm", started a year-long odyssey of research. Over twenty-five quotes and proposals were gotten, reviewed, and adjusted, and at last month's board meeting, a decision was made. Under the leadership of new Media Department Leader Jill Shaffer, new cameras, a computer, and various accessories were to be purchased, all a worthwhile investment for the future.



Just as the 1990s was the era of the "dot-com boom", we are in the era of streaming and social media. These investments will assist us in evangelism but will also provide a stable, worthwhile service for our members.
